Below are some suggested ideas/strategies that you can help with at home.

Unit 1-English Literature – [35%] – 2 hours

May 2018 - Year 10

Section A – Of Mice and Men

Extract Q - 20 min worth 10 marks

Essay Q - (1 from choice of 2) - 40 min. 20 marks

Section B - Unseen Poetry

Comparative essay on two unseen poems – 15 min planning 45 min writing – 20 marks

Unit 2a May 2018 (Year 11) [40%]-2 hours -

Extracts Qs – 20 min (5min....) worth 10 marks Essay Qs – 40 min (10min....) worth 20 marks Total 60 marks

- READ THE NOVEL AT LEAST TWICE AT HOME
- Practise past papers under timed conditions
- Question 1: An Inspector Calls
- Question 2: Heroes
- Select some significant extract from the novel.
- Write exam style questions on the chosen extracts.
- Practise skimming, scanning, highlighting and annotating an extract in no more than 5 minutes.
- Practise using point, evidence, explain (PEE) to structure each paragraph when answering a question.
- ➤ Take a sentence then zoom in on a single word and try to analyse/evaluate its impact.
- Thoroughly revise the **social and historical context** for *An Inspector Calls/ Of Mice and Men*
- Create revision materials, especially mind maps, for each key character and theme.
- Learn a selection of key quotations for each key character and theme- short, memorable, significant.
- Use the list of past paper essay questions to practise creating 10 minute essay plans.
- Read over the text at least another 2 times.
- Write them on post it notes, asked to be tested.
- Use the Oxford Lit Companion.
- ➤ BBC Bitesize.
- Revision booklet and practise questions.

- ➤ Section B2 10 minutes planning, 40 minutes writing 35 marks split 20 content and organisation/15 accuracy)

- Practise past papers under timed conditions, see WJEC website
- Read over mock exams mark schemes to become more familiar with assessment criteria.
- Peer asses the range of mock exam answer in the exemplar booklet issued in class.
- Practise skimming, scanning, highlighting and annotating an extract in no more than 5 minutes.
- Practise using Point, Evidence, Explain (PEE) to structure each paragraph when answering a question.
- > Timing for short answer questions

English Language – Unit 3 – June 2018 Year 11 Unit 3 - 40%

2 hours-untiered

- > 10 mins reading
- > 50 mins answering questions [40 marks]

Section B

- 10 mins planning
- ➤ 50 mins writing [40 marks] [x2 questions 25 minutes each split marks of 10 for content & organisation, 10 for accuracy]

Section A -Reading

- > READ, READ, READ a variety of texts
- Practise past papers under timed conditions
- Read over the mock exam mark schemes to become more familiar with the assessment criteria.
- Peer assess the range of mock exam questions in the exemplar booklet issued in class.

Section A.

- Reading at least one argumentation, one persuasion and one instructional text
- Read different non-fiction material e.g. newspapers, leaflets, blogs, diaries, articles, reviews etc.

Sequencing

INFORMATION RETRIEVAL

- List reasons or details/Make a list of......
- According to this text or writer, how or what or what
- Explain how and / or why
- What evidence does the writer use...?

IMPRESSION/IMAGES

- What do you learn about ...?
- What impression do you get of the writer or an organisation or people?

VIEWPOINT / ATTITUDE

- What are the writer's attitudes towards ...?
- What are the writer's opinions of ...?
- What are the writer's thoughts and feelings about ...?

INTENDED AUDIENCE – PURPOSE OF TEXT

Who is this text aimed at?

ANALYSIS OF PERSUASIVE TECHNIQUE

- How does the writer try to encourage or interest or argue?
- How does this text try to persuade or sell or influence?

COMPARISON OF TEXT

- Compare and contrast these texts.
- Using information from both text, explain why...

Section B – two written tasks

One compulsory argumentation, one compulsory persuasion task, each 200-300 words

Tasks could include: letter, article, leaflet, speech, guide, report, review, etc.
